

The Call Push Shock CPR and AED awareness program is an Australian-first pilot in Victorian schools to teach Year 7 students the skills needed to save a life and improve cardiac arrest survival rates.

The program is designed to be delivered by Victorian teachers and is aligned with curriculum learning areas. Thousands of Victorians suffer an out of hospital cardiac arrest each year. A cardiac arrest occurs when the heart suddenly stops. For every minute without intervention, a person's chance of surviving decreases rapidly. But when a bystander does CPR, a person is twice as likely to survive. If an AED is used, this survival rate dramatically increases. With over 75 per cent of cardiac arrests occurring at home, everyone must know what to do, so that they can help to save a life.
